Patron's Message

It is a great privilege and honor for me to accept the office of the Patron of the Sri Lanka College of Obstetricians & Gynaecologists which I did on the 30th April 2022 and I am deeply honored to continue working with the SLCOG in this capacity.

It was in 1983 that I first joined the SLCOG on my return from UK having passed the MRCOG examination. That was 39 years ago. Looking back on the past 39 years I feel greatly privileged to have been with the SLCOG all these years and seen the great changes which have occurred during this time and being a part of these changes.

As we all know the SLCOG first started as the Association of Obstetrics & Gynaecology of Ceylon in 1953 and continued as such until it became the Ceylon College of Obstetricians & Gynaecologists in 1970. With the advent of the Republican Constitution in 1972 the Association became known as the Sri Lanka College of Obstetricians & Gynaecologists, the prestigious organization of which we are all members.



As we all know the SLCOG first started as the Association of Obstetrics & Gynaecology of Ceylon in 1953 and continued as such until it became the Ceylon College of Obstetricians & Gynaecologists in 1970. With the advent of the Republican Constitution in 1972 the Association became known as the Sri Lanka College of Obstetricians & Gynaecologists, the prestigious organization of which we are all members.

It has been our privilege and a wonderful experience to see the College grow both in the sphere of patient management as well as achieving international recognition, initially with the FIGO Federation Internationale Gynaecologae and Obstetrics, then the Asean Oceania Federation of Obstetrics and Gynecology, The Royal College of Obstetricians & Gynaecologists and later with the formation of the South Asian Federation of Obstetricians & Gynaecologists in the year 2000, also the Perinatal Society and the Menopause Society of Sri Lanka and thereafter with the formation of the South Asian Federation of Menopause Society in the South Asian region. The SLCOG has thus focused on all aspects of maternal and neonatal health as well as the health of the adolescent girls and the post reproductive health of women in our country and in the South Asian region.

Initially, the Ceylon Obstetrics & Gynaecology Association was started with the singular objective of reducing maternal mortality in Sri Lanka which was very high in the early 1900's. This was thus targeted by improving maternal care. From this the SLCOG grew and evolved into an organization which encompassed the different aspects of obstetrics and gynaecology ranging from capacity building by its members to providing policy directions to the state and the Health Ministry to be a globally recognized institution which works hand in hand with many international organizations to improve the health of the women not only in Sri Lanka but in the South Asian region as well as globally.

Many challenges had to be faced during this journey. Our predecessors provided leadership to counter these challenges and uphold the values of the college in order to contribute towards remarkable achievement in women's health in Sri Lanka.

The SLCOG has achieved its current position by adopting meticulous strategies through a dedicated membership.

Thus we have a foundation to work on to fulfill the future responsibilities of our college. The objectives focused on by the SLCOG during the past 55 years are:

- 1. To promote and maintain high standards in Obstetrics and Gynaecology
- 2. To promote a keen sense of professional ethics
- 3. To encourage study and research into problems related to the health of the mother and child as well as adolescent girls and women in the post reproductive age group
- 4. To hold periodical meetings for scientific discussions as well as practical demonstrations on related subjects
- 5. To publish papers and other literary work related to Obstetrics and Gynaecology.

Professional Development

From the commencement of the SLCOG in 1953 professional development of its membership remains the main stay of SLCOG activities. At the outset enhancing the knowledge and skills of the membership by exposure to national and international resources available at that time was identified as the key to achieving these objectives.

Over the years improvement of knowledge, skills and attitude on providing obstetrics and gynecological services by the membership were facilitated by well planned academic activities conducted the SLCOG.

Annual academic sessions often conducted in collaboration with regional or global professional organizations have helped our country to focus on training medical officers on emergency obstetrics care and other specialized services, i.e. social responsibility beyond the call of duty.

he SLCOG takes the responsibility of providing social support whenever the situation arises in our country or in a neighboring country within the areas of our expertise, i.e. during the Tsunami which occurred in Sri Lanka in 2004 and the 30 years of civil war which occurred here and concluded in 2009. The SLCOG worked extremely hard to assist people who needed help during these trying times.

Relationship of SLCOG with international organizations

SLCOG has been a member of FIGO (Federation Internationale Gynaecology and Obstetrics since 1976, however, it became involved as a working group with FIGO only in 2007, in a project to prevent maternal mortality due to unsafe abortions which became a major cause of maternal deaths during this period. Currently, it has a strong associations with FIGO and participates in all the conferences in FIGO in order to gather the necessary knowledge for improving the health of women globally.

AOFOG, interaction of the SLCOG with the AOFOG dates back to 1980's when Sri Lankan born Prof. S S Ratnam (Shan Ratnam) who graduated from the then University of Ceylon was its secretary general. In 1985 Sri Lanka was successful in organizing the Asean Oceania Congress of Obstetrics and Gynaecology in Colombo with Dr. Siva Chinnathamby as the Chairman of the organizing committee. This was a great success. Prof. Shan Ratnam initiated the Young Gynaecologists Award at this event where awards are presented to young Gynaecologists with outstanding all around performances. These awards still continues at AOFOG conferences. Since then the SLCOG has continued to work together with AOFOG and organize many workshops and training programs together for the benefit of women. Currently it is a great pleasure for us that Dr. Rohana Hathtotuwa from Sri Lanka is the Secretary General of AOFOG at present.

SAFOG can trace its beginnings to the desires of the doctors in the South Asian Region to get together and form an organization with regard to maternal and reproductive health of women in their countries which are of similar cultural backgrounds and has similar socioeconomic status. On the suggestion of the late Dr. Rohan Perera a past president of the SLCOG, the SLCOG took the initiative and convened a meeting in Colombo to form an organization named Federation of Obstetrics and Gynaecological societies of the South Asian region. The first meeting of this organization FOGSAR was held in Bali and it was unanimously decided to name the Organisation as SAFOG and to have its headquarters in Colombo.

Prof. Rashid Latiff Khan of Pakistan was the first President of SAFOG and Prof. T A Chowdhry of Bangladesh was the 2nd President of SAFOG and late Dr. Lakshman Fernando from Sri Lanka was inducted the 3rd President of SAFOG. Currently Dr. Rohana Haththutowa from Sri Lanka is the president in this Silver Jubilee year of SAFOG.

RCOG Sri Lanka has had long standing relationships with RCOG i.e. The Royal College of Obstetricians & Gynaecologists UK even before the SLCOG was formed. However, it was after the establishment of the Post Graduate Institute of Medicine and SLCOG association with the conduction of the initial MS and currently the MD examination in Obstetrics and Gynaecology that the relationship with the RCOG increased.

Safe Motherhood Programme

With respect to maternal mortality Sri Lankan statistics reveal that the MMR per 100,000 live births has been the highest from 1900 to 1914. A range of 2327 to 2493. The highest MMR was from 1929-1945, mostly due to the complications of Malaria, due to poor obstetrics education and inexperience in delivery practices as well as antibiotics not been discovered in that era. Most of the deaths were unfortunately avoidable. After 1945 the MMR started to decrease, probably due to the control of Malaria and the discovery of antibiotics.

The SLCOG played a major role in contributing to the reduction of maternal mortality rate by organizing Safe Motherhood programs to educate the healthcare workers in all parts of the island in emergency obstetrics care thus improving the quality of care given to pregnant mothers. The SLCOG focused on organizing Safe Motherhood programs with a view to reducing maternal mortality in 1992 during the Presidency of Prof. Wilfred Perera.

Around 3-4 Safe Motherhood programs are conducted each year in different parts of the country in collaboration with the Ministry of Health and the Family Health Bureau depending on the need based indicators such as the provincial maternal mortality rate. For the past 3 years it has not been possible to conduct the programs as often as we have done before due to the Covid-19 pandemic in the country which prompted us to reduce the exposure of the population to the virus.

The purpose of safe motherhood programs were to educate participants consisting of Midwifery nurses, medical officers of health, field and hospital mid wives and junior doctors in the correct management of pregnant mothers during the antenatal period, time of delivery, in the postpartum period, as well as during the puerperium so that complications did not occur and if they did they could easily be handled. Such programs were conducted at district level in all provinces of the country.

Safe motherhood programs also helped in initiating a dialog with the health administrators of the district providing an opportunity to identify challenges, face facts and find solutions to problems. Currently the maternal mortality rate in Sri Lanka is around 32 per 100,000 live births which is considered to be the best in South Asia. The college also conducts joint meetings with other colleges in order to exchange ideas to find solutions to the problems we experience with respect to various aspects of women's health.

Confidential Inquiry in to Maternal Deaths and Assessment of Acute Severe Morbidity, discussions on this have been carried out by the SLCOG since 2005. However, the SLCOG was unable to format and initiate a confidential inquiry and assess the acute severe morbidities of pregnant mothers until recently.

Recently, the relevant documents were submitted to the Family Health Bureau and approved by the Ministry of Health and a pilot project was carried out. Hopefully this will be a new beginning for our country. Post-partum hemorrhage continued to be the main cause of maternal mortality in Sri Lanka for many years along with pregnancy induced hypertension.

PPH continued to be the leading cause of maternal mortality in Sri Lanka. Prof. Sir Sabaratnam Arulkumaran the then President of RCOG took the initiative to address the issue by an island wide approach to reduce maternal morbidity and mortality due to post-partum hemorrhage through the insertion of post-partum IUCD's a project which was sponsored by the RCOG and the WHO.

It was realized that it was an absolute necessity for the SLCOG and the Ministry of Health to work together in close collaboration because the Ministry of Health administers all the government hospitals in the country. Thus any policy or administrative changes recommended by the SLCOG have to be agreed upon and ratified by the Ministry.

Many presidents of the SLCOG in the 1990's felt that in order to reduce the maternal mortality rate the consultant units in our hospitals needed to be upgraded to provide better and safer care during the antenatal period as well as during delivery and the post-partum period. The SLCOG focused on these issues in order to provide good antenatal care and emergency obstetrics care in the hospitals. Cadre increase and upgrading of all units with better facilities were found to be the most important factors.

Post graduate training and evaluation

Post graduate training and evaluation in Sri Lanka has been practiced from the commencement of university education in the country. From the inception Sri Lanka has maintained a good reputation for PG training of a high standard. Post graduate training has been modeled on the training and evaluation conducted in the UK under the guidance and leadership of the RCOG. During the later years of the 1960's rapid changes were occurring worldwide in both under graduate and post graduate education. It was thus necessary to establish a local institute to guide local post graduate education. Accordingly the government of Sri Lanka established the Post Graduate of Institute of Medicine in 1980 as an establishment within the University of Colombo. The board of study in obstetrics and gynaecology was entrusted with the organization of training and evaluation

Continued Professional Development Programs are carried out by the SLCOG in different parts of the country as training for different categories of medical professionals, i.e. doctors who are consultants, registrars, SHO's etc. These programs are designed to identify a particular target group and tailor made programs are prepared for different categories of medical officers.

The candidates participating are given marks at the end of the program in order to assess them and CPD marks are awarded according to the marking scheme and the category of doctors.

CPD programs are carried out regularly by the SLCOG for all categories of doctors. The CPD marks added up are beneficial to the doctors concerned and helps in their professional development. It is thus important that all obstetricians and gynaecologists get involved in participating in the CPD program as well as joint the college in organizing CPD programs.

One of the things that stands out in our career as Obstetrics and Gynaecology is joining the SLCOG and focusing to improve the health of women in Sri Lanka, the South Asian region as well as globally through FIGO and AOFOG. The SLCOG focuses on Ethical guide lines which are extremely important to us as specialists in Obstetrics and Gynaecology, in clinical practice and management of patients. Maintaining ethical standards is of great importance to carry out our work optimally towards the management of women's health in our country and in the South Asian region. Thus ethical guide lines are considered necessary to play a major role in moulding our attitudes towards the best handling of our patients, by understanding their problems, managing them with kindness and the best facilities available at the moment.

Following the guide lines set by the SLCOG with respect to patient care and management is thus considered to be of vital importance.

In 1983 when I joined the SLCOG the office of the SLCOG was located at the SLMA headquarters in Wijerama Mawatha, Colombo.07. Our office consisted of 02 rooms and it was the dream of all the members of SLCOG to have a building of our own as the SLCOG headquarters.

I look back with happiness at this time as we were able to obtain a block of land in Model Farm Road, Colombo belonging to the UDA which was given to us by the then Minister Mr. Bandula Gunawardene in order to initiate the building of the SLCOG. It was fortunate that I was the incoming President at the time and was able to initiate the building process by organising the laying of the foundation stone in early 2004. The building was completed in 2008 which was remarkable considering that the Tsunami occurring in 2004 causing the cost of the building to treble. However, due to the hard work of our members we were able achieve our objectives and were able to complete the building in 2008.

Our organization the Sri Lanka College of Obstetricians & Gynaecologists have done Sri Lanka proud over the past 55 years and we look to provide insight to the current membership to continue to provide inspiration and direction to continue further achievements through the SLCOG in the years to come so that it remains a key player in the arena of obstetrics and gynaecology at national and international level as it has been since it started.

The event was presided by SLCOG President, Prof. Sanath Lanerolle who handed the Orator's certificate to Prof. Padumadasa.












































CEMD LAUNCHING CEREMONY

In the Southern Province, this was initiated in the Matara BPDHS Office as a hybrid session with



participants plugging in virtually on the platform of zoom. SLCOG was represented by the President of Sri Lanka College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists, Prof Sanath Lanerolle and Dr Mangala Dissanayaka. 

Preparatory course for MD Part 1 for the year 2022 commenced on 29th May at the SLCOG premises. It was organised by the Sri Lanka College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists and the course was coordinated by Dr. Gayan De Siva, Consultant Obstetrician and Gynaecologist and Assistant Secretary SLCOG.

A total of 48 candidates were enrolled for the course. There were many candidates from far away regions such as Mullativu, Jaffna, Batticaloa, Hambanthota and Mannar were among the participants. Due to the lack of public transport and considering the ongoing fuel issue, the course was organised as a hybrid event including in person and online participation via zoom. All speakers were highest experts in their relevant fields including Prof. Rohan Jayasekera, Prof. Malik Goonewardene, Prof. Piyusha Atapattu etc. Gold medalist of MD Part 1 2021, Dr. Chiran Kolombage also shared his experience as a recent most successful candidate and discussed some important topics. The course was stretched up to 4 months with lectures on every other Sundays to make it convenient for the participants with their on call rosters. On the last day, a mock exam was conducted and each participant was given a feedback on their performances.

We were able to earn a sum of 1.38 million rupees were credited to the college account. I hope to improve the standard of the course next year by learning the shortcomings of this course.

Sri Lanka college of Obstetricians and Gynaecologist (SLCOG) and United Nations population Fund (UNFPA) formally agreed to conduct a national mass media sensitization campaign including visual, audio, print and social media to dispel myths and misconceptions about Family Planning and encourage especially women, young people and married couples to make informed decisions about one's sexual and reproductive health choices and obtain relevant services as required in Sri Lanka. This media campaign was a part of national program conducted with the ministry of health and generously supported by the Government of Japan, concluded in July 2022.

The content of the media campaign was mostly on family planning, young people's access to Comprehensive Sexual Education and Sexual Reproductive Health information, unintended pregnancies, menstrual health, decision making and relationships, subfertility etc.


The media dissemination happened in all media had been designed looking at the prime time to be telecasted and broadcasted to achieve a wider coverage. An additional webpage had been created to direct young people for more information on Sexual Reproductive Health and Rights under the SLCOG webpage. Campaign slogan was "A well thought decision leads to a life of happiness". The target population of this media campaign was 12.6 million was achieved by the end of June 2022.



I still remember the casual walk along that fairly long corridor just besides the post natal mothers and neonatal unit leading up to the small mound where the new operating theatre was built on my right side.

The anatomy of the area was typically busy and disorganised as compatible with most of government institutions.

But still this place had some lush character owing to the Indian Ocean on on my left beyond the ribbony Gall Matara road then gradual continental slope off the golden sand.

Reflection of sun could be seen on the waters and sun was blazing down but few dark clouds added some degree of shades on ground with mild breeze gave me some cooling off my internal soul.

Behind me two orderlies were pushing a trolley which was very unhygienic and screaming due to rusty wheels showing how poor our setup was, two or three new mothers with their babies in their hands just wandering aimlessly rhyming something probably cursing us for their pain. The doggies who are brought on by admins to spy on us round the clock were following me as if watching my next action. Little far away on the mound, I could see the old building probably dates back to World War II, where my wife and two year old son lived in utter misery till me finish my term here. The glimpse of old garage just adjacent to parapet wall on the left had few vehicles parked including my green Mitsubishi Toppo ,an unpopular cheap and rare entity. Enjoying all these shear beautiful scenery I propelled my weary tired limbs to the operating theatre, where pre eclamptic mother was waiting to be sectioned It was all quiet normal environment inside, everyone knows their role and ready to kick off. Things went off smoothly as planned and soon new soul came out of that sac after my struggling efforts to counteract the edema and obesity.

Alas !!! at once all lights went off as I was just ligated the angle. It was quiet normal to have power interruptions but this was super abnormal as seconds turned into minutes and my cell phone rang twice and stopped.

Door opened in the theater and I heard voices shouting "it's commmmilliinnnngggg!!!!"

Few barged into the theatre and shouted that we are about to be doomed as ocean has come to our door step. We were still in total darknesses. For some strange reason I didn't think of running away. I knew the phenomenon of Tsunami by watching the film "Great Impact "and I told it could have been a one of those. But I didn't remember the name Tsunami. Anyway there wasn't much halabaloo inside and we managed to finish off the surgery despite the absence of an assistant nurse. One other nurse came later to finish it up. My house officer and anesthesiologist and minor staff was there and it was finished with the laryngoscope light.

Any way pt was taken out of theatre and I wondered off to that old building where my family lived.

Of course my son was so devastated seeing the destruction outside and he was shivering and ran to me. I took the keys of my car and went down to park it somewhere else.!!!!!!

Scene was astonishing and dreadful!!!

There was no Galle Road, only brickbats, whole line of houses and even bus stand was no more.

Ocean has drained away and could see the sand for long distance with occasional fish dancing on the sand.

One man walking alone, dead baby on his hands still baby was frothing but no sign of life, nothing no scream no talking absolute silence!!!!!

The silence of Death.!!!!

I wandered down to find my car and it was found that even garage and parapet wall, all washed off. My car was found about 300 meters away and luckily only with minor damages to body but it has been submerged and later had to abandoned.

My other colleagues were there down the ground with the help of villagers transferring patients to TH Karapitiya. striking feature was there was no any admin to guide anything it was all done by available registrars, senior house officers interns and non clinical staff.


Me wife and my son all walked about one and half km to reach another doctors house in fear of Tsunami coming again. We had to walk in knee height water with bags on head, typical feature of refugees.

Any way with the help of many we managed to setup some sort of clinical care for mothers in Karapitiya. Some mothers delivered in surgical and medical unit. There was no calling system to seniors. I could remember that we had to do a staff emergency section with available tools and very pathetic to see a ruptured ectopic saved on nick of time despite all these chaos. Instantly we became beggars and refugees with mothers to look after. But all the registrars, SHOs and interns and all other staff did an amazing job for days with all dedication until we establish a some sort of unit to care the mothers. There was no proper authority for days to look after anything

That's the day I learned that maternal care even though it's said very important and boasted everywhere it's on our own hands and there was no authority to look after it but only to find faults.

CRISIS AT THE MIDDLE OF A CRISIS



Unlike other times, the last two months were extremely stressful and hectic for all my consultant colleagues including myself at DOH Nuwara Eliya. I'm pretty sure this would have been a common experience for most consultants working in the periphery island wide. This was due to the ongoing crisis which had spread to every corner of the island from the month of June onwards.

Nonavailability of fuel, gas and sky-high prices for essential goods affected our community in many ways. Public commuting was badly affected; hence patients did not have access for health care providers on most occasions. As a result, most necessary investigations were delayed, so does the diagnosing and appropriate medical interventions.

Furthermore, delays in seeking medical attention were frequently observed leading to significant increase in morbidity, Mortality and near misses. The impact for maternity and gynaecology unit was overwhelming. The mounting number of on-admission IUD's and collapsed patients due to leaking ectopic pregnancies, eclampsia and APH etc.

However, the benign gynecology electives were postponed in order to spare available medication and surgical consumables for emergencies and malignancies. As a result, waiting time for benign surgeries prolonged and extended. Therefore, increased hospital admissions noted related to benign gynecological conditions.

A noticeable increase in antenatal admissions observed because of the trend for early admissions well in advance to their expected delivery date considering existing transport difficulties. Surprisingly the ward was inundated with patients' putting excessive pressure on all staff members.


Besides all this drama the new batch of interns arrived late June making the situation worse for everyone. In addition, travelling home from workstations became a nightmare we were compelled to use public transport. Not only us, but also our beloved ones are also stressed out.

It's slowly recovering, but not yet over and will be remembered as most challenging few months in everyone's lives.....



SLCOG MEETS WITH RCOG FOR MOU

Sri Lanka College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists (SLCOG) and the Royal College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists (RCOG) have been working hand in hand over the years to improve women's health and improve quality of training in obstetrics and gynaecology.

President SLCOG Professor Sanath Lanarolle initiated a dialogue with President RCOG Mr Edward Morris in view of reviving the Memorandum of understanding (MoU) between SLCOG and RCOG. As a result, a special meeting was held between the two colleges on 13th of June 2022, during the RCOG world congress 2022 in London. Representing SLCOG, immediate past president of SLCOG; Professor Pradeep De Silva and SLCOG council member Dr Achintha Dissanayake, participated for the meeting. President RCOG Dr Edward Morris, CEO of RCOG Kate Lancaster participated on behalf of the RCOG.

A fruitful discussion was made on facilitating short term clinical attachments for members of SLCOG with full GMC registration, in the fields of feto-maternal medicine, urogynaecology, robotic Surgery, advanced endoscopic surgery and subfertility. Arranging short term clinical attachments in Sri Lanka for consultants and trainees in United Kingdom in liaison with SLCOG was also discussed.

Furthermore, discussions were conducted on the new MRCOG exam format and its adaptability to the local obstetrics and gynaecology curriculum. SLCOG requested opportunities for training on conducting MRCOG part 3 examinations for senior fellows and members of the college. RCOG representatives were informed of the success of the Medical trainee initiative (MTI) program and how several former MTI trainees were in cooperating their experiences gained during the program for the improvement of women's health in Sri Lanka.

Professor Pradeep Silva briefly explained the current political and economic situation of the country and its impact to college activities. SLCOG explained its successful campaign of Covid 19 vaccination in pregnancy and how the tireless efforts of the membership contributed to minimize the impact of Covid 19 on pregnant women. On behalf of the President SLCOG, Professor Pradeep Silva cordially invited RCOG President Dr Edward Morris and his team to participate for the 2022 SLCOG - SAFOG congress to be held in September 2022. RCOG was eager to follow up on the above topics and will be arranging a detailed follow up meeting which will hopefully translate into a mutually beneficial MoU between the two prestigious colleges.


